Pastoral Letter

Dear Friends,

"If you're a traitor I'll never talk to you again!" says Mollie to Harry. Chosen Traitor, treacherous 23 year old smiling baby-faced Harry assures sweet Mollie that she needn't worry, because he's '100% faithful'. His justification for such hoodwinking and backstabbing behaviour is that "It's only a game!" the aim of which is to return home with all, or a share, of up to £120K, which is banked through united demanding team missions. What became apparent was the social experiment of glorification for lying, deceit and betrayal. It would have been easy to turn over the programme and yet somehow, I became intrigued.

As someone who studied anthropology as well as sociology at university before ministry it was hilarious watching how wrong everyone gets their conclusions as to who the traitors are, thus banishing many 'faithfuls'. While the traitors sow seeds of suspicion on the innocent, and deflect attention from themselves, the poor faithfuls sink in a sea of subjectivity, their views founded on fickle feelings about their fellow contestants rather than objective convicting facts. That is apart from Jason (Jaz) the only one to suspect the arch traitor throughout his time. For Jason, his life experiences enabled him to recognise that anyone and everyone is capable of betrayal, of lies, of treachery. even the most convincing faithful could turn out to be a traitor; for him it was his father.

This type of cynicism, suspicion is not new. We are living in a time of uncertainty, where words are simply that ... empty words ... with no meaning, no purpose. We are losing confidence in politicians, journalists, church leaders and other public fronting people. It is good that almost all exposed and banished traitors speak of great relief that they can now be themselves once again and how hard it was to be so two faced. From the comfort of our sofas we can view shows like 'Traitors' as 'just a game'. But Jaz's backstory is sobering and a reminder of the damage that daily deception and betrayal wreak in our world.

If we turn to the scriptures, we are reminded that Jesus spent two years with his twelve faithfuls; one of whom betrayed him to death (Judas), another major player Peter who denied he knew Jesus on the eve of his killing. Remarkably Jesus knew who the faithfuls and traitors were and loved them all the same, ready to forgive and free them to rise above their faults and fears to shine with God's Love, filled with Grace and Truth. We all have much to learn from Jesus about living truthfully and well, so let us ask ourselves "Is this man Jesus who he claimed to be, God in human form?" or is he a 'treacherous liar' or 'raving lunatic' - 'Mad, Bad, or God?'

The answer to this question can join us with myriad 'faithfuls' gone before us and open the door to the loving faithfulness, forgiveness and fruitfulness we are made for.

Cream Egg Covers

Needles - 4mm (size 8) and 3mm (size 11)

Body for chick - yellow and rabbit -fawn

- 1. Using 4mm needles cast on 30 stitches and knit 27 rows. Cast off.
- 2. Sew cast on and cast off sides together.
- 3. By threading the wool in and out gather up one end to a point and tie off.
- 4. Turn whole thing inside out and gather up second open end as above.
- 5. Push second end inside first end.
- 6. Finish each animal as follows.

Chicken


Using same wool as body make a few loops top of the head sew securely.

<u>Wings</u> - Use 3mm pins and cast on 5 stitches. Knit 5 rows and cast off. Sew cast on and cast off ends together and sew onto bodies. Make face (see below)

Rabbit

<u>Ears</u> - Using 3mm pins cast on 8 stitches and knit 5 rows. Fold in half lengthways, sew and sew on to bunny.

Make white pompom for tail.

Pocket Prayer Cloth

Any aran weight wool although cotton aran gives the softest feel.

3.25 needles (size 10 in old money)

Finished cloth should measure 3.5ins X 4.5ins If it works out too small go up a needle size

Cast on 16 stitches

Row 1-3: Knit across.

Row 4: K2, P12, K2.

Row 5: Knit across.

Row 6: K2, P4, K4, P4, K2.

Row 7: Knit across.

Row 8: K2, P4, K4, P4, K2.

Row 9: Knit across.

Row 10: K2, P4, K4, P4, K2.

Row 11: Knit across.

Row 12: K2, P4, K4, P4, K2,

Row 13: Knit across.

Row 14: K2, F4, K4, P4, K2.

Row 15: Knit across.

Row 16: K2, P4, K4, P4, K2.

Row 17: Knit across.

Row 18: K2, F4, K4, P4, K2.

Row 19: Knit across.

Row 20: K2, P1, K10, P1, K2.

Row 21: Knit across.

Row 22: K2, P1, K10, P1, K2.

Row 23: Knit across.

Row 24: K2, P1, K10, P1, K2.

Row 25: Knit across.

Row 26: K2, F4, K4, F4, K2.

Row 27: Knit across.

Row 28: K2, P4, K4, P4, K2.



WaterAid Lent Appeal 2024



We are once again in the season of Lent and we are once again collecting for WaterAid to help in their efforts to ensure that everyone on Planet Earth will have access to clean water and good sanitation and hygiene services by the year 2030. We are all hoping that the Group will have another successful year in 2024, keep your fingers crossed for some favourable weather to help us in our efforts.


