Pastoral Letter



As a child you always believed that your parents were invincible and for most of their lives that is true. True in the sense that they can hide a lot of what is going on until circumstances change. All of a sudden, their needs change, their dependence upon their child is reversed. The child in many ways becomes the parent per se. and that is a new experience for many. That one person who throughout your life, was the cheerleader, the get up and roll up your sleeves inspiration, who now looks at you with such vulnerability and on occasions with fear and trepidation especially if they are in an environment in which they have no experience.

What must it be like for them to ask their child to become the carer? How do they live with their guilt, how do they maintain their independence, their dignity and be open with their tears? Life is hard. Caring for loved ones is hard, as they will no doubt push us to our limits as parents do, but it is also a privilege and a blessing to be able to return the love and care that they have given to us in their own way.

So, to all who are in similar situations, know that God is always with us even it if feels at times that God is silent. God will be our strength and shield in whom we can trust for it is written: (Isaiah 40: 29, 31)

He gives power to the faint and strengthens the powerless.

Those who wait for the lord shall renew their strength;

they shall mount up with wings like eagles.

They shall run and not be weary.

They shall walk and not faint.

Christian Aid

Looking back 80 years to when it all began. Responding to the devastation of the Second World War in Europe in 1945, Churches across the UK started to use the National Day of Thanksgiving for Victory, 9th May, to show solidarity with Europe. They raised £80k so that partner churches in mainland Europe could support warstricken communities.

The then newly named Inter-church Aid and Refugee Service went on in the 1950s to expand their work to Korea, Hong Kong, occupied Palestine and Europe. In 1957 we saw the first Christian Aid week as we know it today. It was the largest public act of Christian witness.

They also helped to found the Voluntary Service Overseas (VSO) which went on to support 85 million people. From such humble beginnings Christian Aid has succeeded in supporting millions worldwide and continues

Nature Notes October 2025

As we approach Autumn I think we can definitely say it's been quite the year for sunny weather. With this however has come challenges for gardeners. Not only was it too hot to be out in the garden for long periods but watering became a daily chore.

I suppose in a small way it has given us a taste of what people in areas of drought have to deal with, remembering that they can't just turn on a tap and get water as we can do. A few days away and an unattended garden could be reduced to a wilderness with plants lost and grass struggling.

As our world heats up these challenges will become more prominent so please give a thought to those less fortunate, living in temperatures of 45°C and higher. These countries are trying hard to come up with solutions to deal with climate change such as building keyhole gardens with water aid helping them by providing much needed water. Our problems are so tiny and most of our gardens are for pleasure and not for existence.

Our wildlife is on the move with our summer residents heading off to warmer climes and our winter visitors are starting to arrive. It's lovely to hear the sound of pink footed geese flying over head.

The fledglings are now independent and starting to get their adult plumage which is lovely to watch. It's amazing to watch them go from small featherless beings to fully fledged birds.

I've been on a few bat walks recently, one of which was in Glasgows Botanic Garden. It was lovely to get the gardens to ourselves with the greenhouses lit up. It was a great evening with lots of enthusiastic visitors.

This is the mating time for the bats and preparation for hibernation (torpor). Like lots of other mammals they breed now but can delay fertilisation until spring. Animals never fail to amaze me. These tiny pipistrelle bats heart rates can range from 4 - 1000+beats/min which just blows my mind, to think something so small can survive with that range.

Many congratulations and thanks to Grow Uddingston for winning another Gold Award and for keeping the village and church grounds looking so beautiful.
























LIFE'S CROSSROADS

The clinic will be run by Linda Smith CAB Out Reach Community Adviser.

Linda's focus as a community adviser is the over 65's group but she will see anyone who is looking for help.

Citizens Advice Hamilton has several teams that she can signpost folk to including:

HWA - Health and Wellbeing team

Layrep - Representation at Hamilton Sheriff Court and predominantly housing issues.

Older Persons Project - Income maximisation and other enquiries for over 65's

PASS - Patient Advice and Support Service

Energy Service - all matters electricity/gas

General service - all enquiries including emergency fuel & food vouchers.

Community Links - local NHS and community group referrals

Money Advice - Financial Services

Veterans Services - Referral available to veteran's associations UK wide.
